has an 800 number to sell the mattresses and bed covers because so many guests have asked to buy them. I'm getting one as soon as I can find the 800 number I lost - along with four dozen golf balls on eight courses).

The third hole at Punta Mita is gimmicky but great. After playing the par 3, there's another par 3 third hole. Yes, there are 19 holes. The (alternate) green, on a miniature island out in the ocean, is framed by black boulders. At low tide, you can walk on a rock pathway to the green. At high tide, a caddie in an amphibious golf court drives you to the green. (And you can count the score on either of the third holes.)

The pro at Punta Mita said to me (no brag, just fact): "This is the best golf course in all of Mexico and one of the best in all of North America." The staff was No. 1; the facilities were No. 1; the condition of the course was No. 1; the touches were No. 1; the price was No. 1 (\$195, but you have to have a letter - or a forgery - from your own country club to be able to play), and it was No. 1 in degree of pleasure, difficulty, fascination and serenity.

Until

1. El Tamarindo

I have died and gone to El Tamarindo. This golf club and resort should have an asterisk for two reasons. You can't include it with the Magnificent Seven because it stands alone, literally and figuratively.

El Tamarindo Resort and Golf Club is about 2 1/2 hours south by car, 45 minutes by air, of Puerto Vallarta. Tamarindo is located in a authentic jungle preserve that flows directly into the ocean. Twenty-nine villas are on or steps away from the pristine and secluded pearl-white beach of the Pacific. Each villa has its own splash pool and beds on the patio, so you can recline under the sun and sleep under the stars.

Tame and wild animals roam the jungle. A wild pig came by during the night. The next morning I asked at breakfast if that actually had been a pig.

"Yes, it's on the menu. Catch of the day - fresh bacon." But enough about the resort.

This is one of the five grandest golfing experiences I've ever had, and I've played Augusta National, St. Andrews, Pebble Beach and some of the world's most famous courses from Fiji to Hawaii to Germany to Nebraska. A Robert Trent Jones Jr., David Fleming design, El Tamarindo has seven oceanside holes, and the eighth and ninth are on cliffs with the waves crashing beneath. It steals your breath.

"Please don't tell anybody about Tamarindo," said my playing partner, a business executive from Santa Fe. "My first time here, and I want to keep it my personal secret." So special.

How much does it cost? I don't know. It's one of those "If you have to ask

... ", but it's more than worth it.

from a reputable firm before you go, but don't try to be too thrifty - if you get my drift - Thrifty) to the Mayan Palace Golf Resort, I fell in love. Great golf course.

I was placed with a neurologist and his wife from Kentucky, and all three of us agreed this was one of the most intriguing courses we had played in quite a while. The 17th hole, next to the breaking waves off the Pacific, is a par 3 over a lagoon - with a severe crosswind.

The doctor and I became a pair of stupid Tin Cuppers. He put six in the water; I drowned eight. Our caddies laughed. I handed my caddie a club and said, "See if your caddie shack butt can do any better."

He hit a swell 180-yard 5-iron. The hole is 187 yards. Sink. I laughed at him. We did a high 5. We will be exchanging Feliz Navidad cards every year. The round cost \$175, but you get what you pay for. And there is no such thing as a free breakfast.

4. and 3. Vista Vallarta Golf Resort

Twins, but not identical. One is a Jack Nicklaus Signature Course and the other a Tom Weiskopf Signature Course. What "Signature Course" means is that golf architects who work for the (former Ohio State) golfers actually designed the course in the style preferred by

the two famed pros, and Nicklaus and Weiskopf ultimately blessed them.

Vista Vallarta was developed by a Dallas company that intends to make the area east of town (and past the bullring) "the premier golfing destination in Mexico." I would have liked them better if both courses had been near the ocean instead of the hills, but they've got wonderful views of the Sierra Madre and Puerto Vallarta, and both are supreme and demanding, but totally enjoyable.

The Nicklaus course meanders through ravines and dense undergrowth and alongside a creek, while the Weiskopf course is a bit more wide open and - in one lizard's opinion - more thought-provoking and a better idea (because most people are playing the Nicklaus course, so you can tour the Weiskopf course in three hours if you're alone, as I always am).

The Weiskopf 13th is where I met my pal Iggy. We had a 15-minute discussion (I did most of the talking), and after I teed off, I looked back and Iggy was gone. Probably had to go join Richard Burton.

Vista Vallarta is making a LARGE name for itself. Although it opened just more than a year ago, Vista Vallarta was the host for the United States Collegiate Golf Championships last year and this December will be the site of the third World Golf Championships. (Tiger Woods and David Duval won the first in Argentina, and Ernie Els and Retief Goosen last year's in Japan.) Two-man teams from 24 countries will be represented. You'll see it on TV before Christmas. That tournament will put Vista Vallarta on the map, so go before December.

2. Punta Mita Golf Club

Situated smartly at the exclusive new The Four Seasons Resort about 30 minutes north of Puerto Vallarta, this Jack Nicklaus course (he did it, no signature) is stupendous. Views of the ocean from every hole. Palm trees and breezes and blooming flowers.

Here's a pleasant touch that sums up Punta Mita. Every few holes an attendant shows up to provide you with a cold face towel. Man, the course is an examination. Woman, the course is a heavenly delight.

(Pardon the interruption. The Four Seasons resort is big time in luxury, detail, splendor and price. And it is isolated. Meanwhile, the rooms at the Westin Regina are hundreds of dollars a night cheaper and just as luxurious - and include the Heavenly Bed. The Heavenly Bed is that. Trust me. That's why Westin now

The Knight of the Iguana's Eight Places to Play in Puerto Vallarta (in ascending order) are:

8. Marina Vallarta Golf Club

A nice, handy layout in the newer marina section north of downtown and adjacent to the airport and Banderas Bay and the beach. It's not hard or unique, but three holes reach toward the water, the folks are friendly and the price is reasonable for a vacation area course (\$120 for 18 holes, cheaper after 2 p.m., and there are package deals with the nearby hotels). You can walk to the course from the Westin Regina and the Marriott CasaMagna, my two favorite and the classiest resorts in Marina Vallarta. I suggest starting with this course and working up to the more difficult, more scenic and more luxurious courses.

7. Flamingo Golf Club

Puerto Vallarta's first course, about 15 miles north of town. The government owned Flamingo and, truthfully, allowed it to become ragged and run-down. But the acreage has been purchased by an outfit out of Mexico City with grandiose plans to transform the rolling hills that fade to the ocean into a top course condominium/hotel complex.

The first phase was starting the day after I played. An entire new irrigation system was being installed. If you go soon, only nine holes are available for play, but the price for playing the nine holes (twice) will be as cheap as lunch. And Flamingo is fun.

I liked the alligators, the mango trees along the fairways, the great breakfast, the testy par 3s, the two brothers who were hired to run the operation and the caddie who spoke almost no English. By the end of my adventurous round, Miguel and I had taught each other how to say, in the other's language, the seven swear words you can't utter on radio.

6. Paradise Village Golf Course

One of the several new layouts around P.V., this one is located in Nuevo Vallarta north of town and the airport. It meanders among time shares and condos and is nothing unique, but if you're playing several courses, you would include it as an attractive, taxing addition. A round is priced at \$160 (in high - winter - season), but, as at every other course, the "sunset" rates are seriously lower. And why not play after 2 p.m., especially if you're me and your only companion is a fellow lizard?

5. Mayan Palace Golf Resort

I'm giving you the bad news first, but there's real good news upcoming. A guy stopped me on the street in Marina Vallarta and, when he heard my terrible high-school Spanish, complimented me on speaking the language so well. That should have been a clue.

"Moo-chus graa-sius," I said.

"Muy bueno," he said.

Because I was such a brilliant linguist and a tan and handsome man, he offered me free breakfast at the Mayan Palace (and a fishing tour in the afternoon). I accepted his kind gift. Then he told me I had to give him 10 American dollars to reserve my free breakfast. I replied using one of the Spanish words the caddie had taught me at Flamingo Golf Club.

So, when I drove out in my rented Jeep (from a company whose name I won't mention because it was a ripoff, and be sure to rent a Jeep to tool around in Puerto Vallarta, but reserve it through a travel agent

Security

Either before or after arriving, you will be given a key to the main front gate at Los Palmares. If you don't have your key, don't worry, ring the bell and you will be "buzzed in." Los Palmares has around the clock security. The grounds are always lit. There are surveillance cameras. All of this is pre-cautionary. During our ownership of Villa Karaway, we have NEVER had any problems with vandalism or theft.

If you haven't received a key via mail, we will have keys there for you. A separate key is used for the main Los Palmares gate versus Villa Karaway's front door. If you require additional keys, please ask Enrique.

Almost every door in Villa Karaway locks. We have a container of keys to all of the doors located in the bar area.

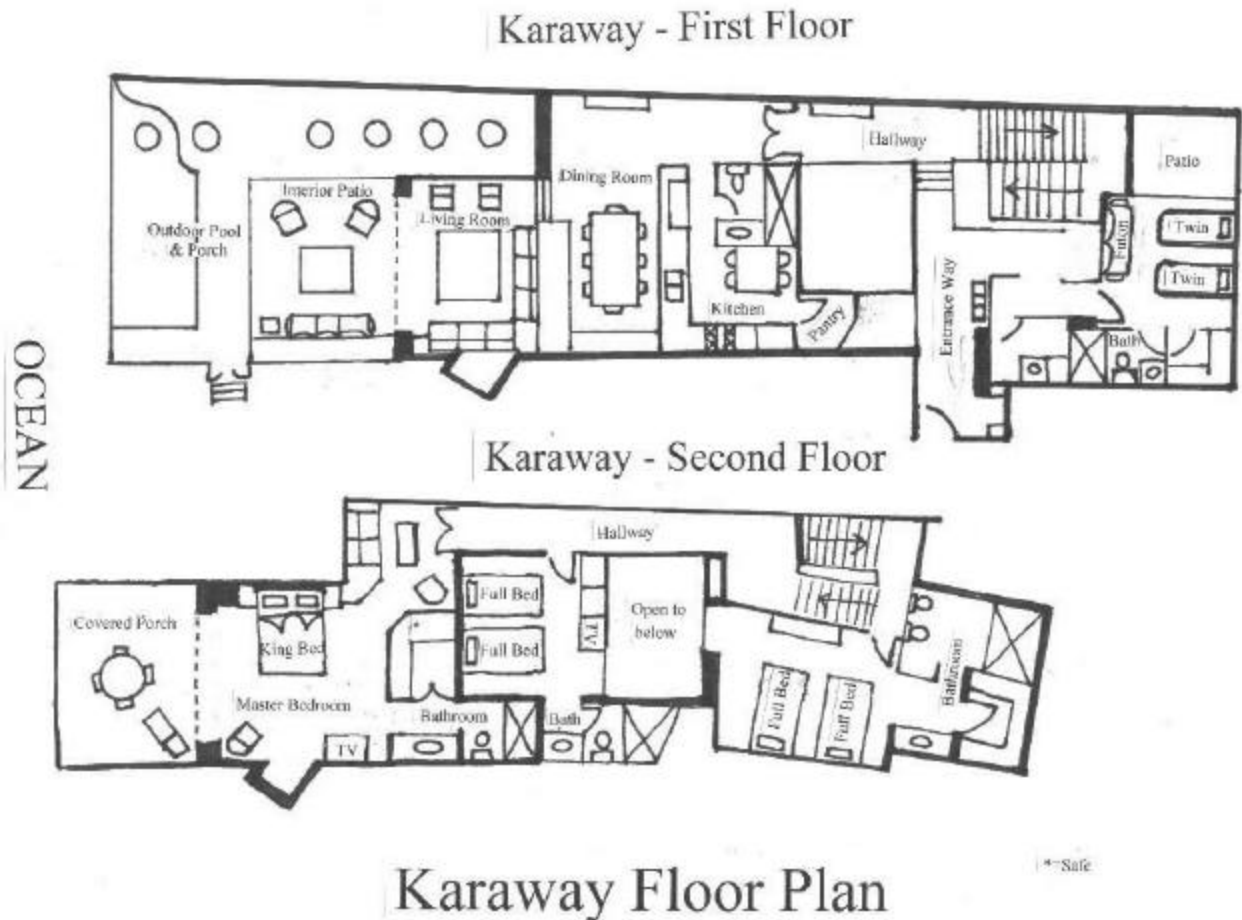
Insects

Puerto Vallarta is in the "tropical zone." Just across the street from Los Palmares and Villa Karaway is a jungle. While Los Palmares has a pest eradication program, there might be times that you see a large insect. If you see more than one or two, please let the staff or the front desk of Los Palmares know and we will have the pest control people pay an extra visit. Also, mosquitoes are plentiful. While we have a centralized bug zapper, insect repellent is highly recommended. We also recommend that you close your doors when sleeping. This will help keep mosquitoes at bay.

Smoking

We request that you do not smoke inside Villa Karaway. However, we have plentiful outdoor deck space where you can enjoy a cigarette or a nice Cuban cigar. Ashtrays are provided.

Transportation

Getting to town is easy. Go to the road outside Los Palmares and walk about 30 meters to your left and cross the road. There is a phone and a shack there. This is the bus stop. Buses come by about every 10 to 15 minutes. At the time of this writing, the bus fare is 4 pesos. The trip is about 10 to 15 minutes, depending on traffic and the number of stops. Buses run between 6 am to 10 pm and a bit later on Friday and Saturday nights.

Sometimes there is a taxi parked at the resort just north of Los Palmares. If not, you can ask the front desk to call a cab for you. They are parked near by, so you should have one within minutes. Finally, you can stand outside and wait for a cab, which usually comes along on a frequent basis.

A cab fare into town will be about 50 pesos (\$5 USD). A cab fare to the airport will be about 140 pesos (\$14 USD).

You can rent a car via Los Palmares front desk or ask our manager, Enrique, to assist you.

These names will come in handy when assigning bedrooms. There are tile plaques besides each bedroom showing the name.

Jacuzzi Tub in the Master (Heaven)

This is probably the most complicated piece of equipment at Villa Karaway. With a bit of experimentation, you'll learn to operate it. The top dial controls the bathtub, shower, and 20-spigot side shower. The shower has it's own controls on showerhead.

If you want to use the jets, please fill the tub first BEFORE running the jets. A push button switch on the edge closest to you controls the jets. The other dials are for the intensity of the jets.

There is also a steam. This is controlled by a push button on the upper left side of the tub wall. Please be CAREFUL. Upon activation, extremely hot steam exits the small round hole on the tub at the water full level.

Utilities

Electricity in Mexico is VERY expensive. For two months in a past winter, we had a power bill of over \$1,900 USD! Please help us conserve so we can keep our rental rates reasonable. Use common sense. If you are not in a room, please do not operate the air conditioning. When in the room, please also use the ceiling fans to help circulate the air and do not open windows if the air conditioning is on. Please also turn off lights when not in use. Thank you for your consideration.

All rooms are air conditioned except for the hallways and the laundry room.

The Beach and the Ocean

No beach in Mexico is private. However, many developments try to make it more difficult for people to reach the beach in front of their property. So is the case at Los Palmares. You'll find others enjoying the beach out front, but it should not be crowded. There is a roped off section for owners and guests of Los Palmares.

There are two gates between the Los Palmares complex and the ocean. They have a key code lock. Please check with the front desk for the current lock combination. At the time of this writing, you push 2 and 4 simultaneously, release, and then push the third button, release and turn the gate knob to the right.

Los Palmares has a man made reef off of the shore. This protects our sandy beach. It also provides for a protected swimming area. Great surf can be found on either side of this reef. Pictured to the right is the beach in front of Villa Karaway, the man made reefs, and, of course, a sunset. This picture was taken just to the side of the porch and pool of Villa Karaway.



Snorkeling and scuba diving are available, but do not expect the water clarity that is found in the Caribbean. You are welcome to bring your mask and snorkel. Close by you can snorkel the man made reef, the Los Arcos area, or better yet, take a tour.

Toys

We have a good supply of water toys for you to use. There is a one-person inflatable kayak. Please use the provided life jacket. We have life jackets to help with your safety. There are also boogie boards and some rafts. Please use life jackets whenever you feel unsafe with the water conditions.

There are several board games located in the food pantry off of the kitchen.

Dinking Water

Los Palmares has the latest water filtration and purification system. This system is located on our grounds. You can safely drink from the tap. However, **DO NOT** drink from the lawn watering taps. Water is monitored and tested monthly. This purification system is expensive and therefore the water here is expensive. Please do not waste the water or take long showers.

Bedroom names

For your convenience (and for fun), we have named our four bedrooms. The names (beginning with the bottom bedroom and going up the stairs, down the hallway) are:

- The Sea – el Mar
- Clouds – Nubes
- The Sun – el Sol
- Heaven – Ciero

The phone number should show 2230300 with user name villakaraway. Please don't change this. AOL has recently arrived in PV. If you have an AOL account, get the local PV number and sign in.

There should be blank RW-CDs for you to make copies of your favorite photos while in Puerto Vallarta. Therefore, make sure to bring your digital camera. You'll be able to give the photos you take to friends that are joining you at Villa Karaway before they go home.

Safe

You are welcome to use the safe in the master bedroom's closet. Presently, the code for the safe is 33500. For this to work, the key device next to the key pad must be in the out position. Sometimes people will push this lock in. Please don't do this so others can use the safe. But if you find the safe locked, ask Adela or Gloria for the safe unlocking key. After using the key, please return it.

Ceiling fans and washer/dryer

Many rooms have ceiling fans. A wall switch marked "fan" and a white remote control that should be in the room with the fan controls them. The switch must be on before the remote control will work. You might have to "experiment" with the wall switch because more than one wall switch can control the fans in the dining room, living room, and porch area. These fans can do a wonderful job of cooling the room. Please try them before, or in conjunction with, using the air conditioning system.

There is a washer and dryer in Villa Karaway and others are located behind the large palapa, by the restrooms for the large pool area. Ordinarily, guests are responsible for cleaning their own laundry. You can request Gloria to do your laundry, but please consider an additional tip if she assists.

Entertainment

For entertainment, Villa Karaway has four TVs, all with VCR players, a CD player in the dining room and a CD player in the master bedroom. There is also a Sega Dreamcast with games. Please bring your favorite movies or CDs. We do have some movies and CDs on-site, and, of course, we request that you leave these at Villa Karaway.

Pools

The pool in front of the porch is your private pool to enjoy. No one else has access to this pool. Here are a few tips to keep the pool in top shape.

The pumps and filter are located on the south side (left, when facing the ocean) of the pool. All equipment is on a timer. It turns on in the morning and off around dinner time. If you have a problem, or want the water warmer, please ask Adela or Gloria to assist you. Please try to rinse all sand off before entering the pool. A faucet is located on the steps coming into the patio.

There is a much larger pool for your enjoyment. This is shared with the Los Palmares Resort. No glass containers are allowed at anytime. Please limit food around this pool.

We provide numerous beach towels. No need to bring any towels with you!

We have two lines at Villa Karaway. Most of the phones are the internal line for the resort. The other phone in the living room and on the fax machine is the outside line. You can also make local calls on this line. Both lines are blocked from making long distance calls. To make a long distance call, please use the phone located in the Los Palmares lobby. We suggest that you use a calling card. For your reference, here are a few access numbers:

You can also buy a calling card from the front desk that works in the lobby pay phone.

The direct number to Villa Karaway is 221-5800. (From the States, the number is 011-52-322-221-5800, where 52 is Mexico's country code, 322 is the area code for Puerto Vallarta.) Local calls are no charge. Anyone call you at Villa Karaway. People can also call you by dialing 221-5295 and asking for Unit 104. From the US, the number is 011-52-322-221-5295. To call the front desk, dial 1100.

Food and Beverage service

You need to complete a menu (a copy is included toward the end of this document) and fax or email it to Enrique Gonzales, as stated on the menu.

Adela, the cook, will purchase the items on the list. This includes stocking the refrigerator per your instructions. You can also communicate with her what you want to eat for the next day. At the end of each day, please request the bill for the food and beverages from Adela and reimburse her. She might have a charge for a taxi. If she has large amounts of food to bring, she will take a taxi.

Keep in mind that some food is very reasonably priced in Mexico, while some food is more expensive. Beer and shrimp are examples of food/beverages that is priced comparably to the US market. Beef, chicken, fruits and vegetables are cheaper. The bread and pastry is fantastic, so make sure to try some.

Other items provided: We have a coffee maker, but not a coffee grinder. There is a microwave, dishwasher, and toaster. We strive to make you as comfortable at Villa Karaway as you would be in your own home. Please also check the pantry for a variety of indoor and outdoor games. Our favorite is Bocce Ball, an Italian lawn bowling game.

Computer and Internet Access

There might be a computer on site. If not, we have the ability for you to use your computer and modem to get on-line. The computer at Villa Karaway is for your enjoyment. It has a CD writer and a DVD drive.

To turn on:

Computer: there is a round button on the front that you push to turn on the computer.

You might need to push the bottom button on the right side of the monitor.

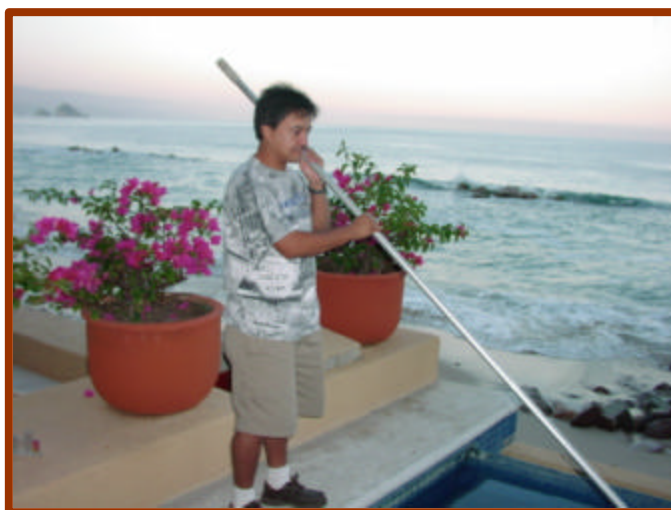
Turn on the printer by pushing the bottom button on the right side.

Internet access:

The computer is running Windows XP Home. On the desktop you'll find the "Puerto Vallarta ISP" icon.

Double click to open and click on the "Dial" button.

Suggested tipping: Both Gloria and Adela are expecting tips. Suggested tips range from \$2 to \$4 (US dollars) per day PER guest for each of the help. Please be generous. You can use this formula for the cook, Adela, or pay her approximately 15% of the cost of food as a tip.

Please note that both Gloria and Adela do not speak english. We have a spanish-english dictionary to assist you. You can also call our property manager, (see next paragraph) for some help. However, if you do not speak spanish, you'll find that you can still communicate effectively. Try out some words - and have fun! We also have a few reference books on Puerto Vallarta. Please be respectful and leave the books for others to enjoy.

Security Deposit: If you paid a security deposit, we will refund it within 30 days upon receipt of the key and report from our property management of no damage or theft.

NOTE! Please obey ALL condo rules! If you are in violation, you will be asked to immediately leave and there will be no refund of unused rent. The rules are located in the book on the large coffee table in the family room, or you can request them from the front desk.

About the

Phone service

The phone number at Los Palmares resort is 52-322-221-5295. People dialing this, and other numbers from the States to Mexico must first dial a 011. (52 is the country code for Mexico; 322 is the area code for Puerto Vallarta.) If callers dial the Los Palmares Resort, they must request Unit 104.

There is an on-site restaurant - "The Palapa." It is open for breakfast and lunch, Monday through Saturday. When you are presented the bill, please pay in pesos and please don't forget a tip. They might allow you to charge the bill to Unit 104. In this case, please make sure to leave a tip and then settle your bill before you leave.

Inside Villa Karaway, the floor-to-ceiling glass window/walls require special instructions for opening and closing. To open, make sure that all of the locks (located on the bottom of the frames) are in the down position. This provides the locks to come out of their floor slots. Then pull gently on the first frame away from the handle while pushing on the handle. Be careful not to pinch your fingers. This action should be effortless. If you find yourself forcing the door open - please ask the staff for assistance.

Caution: Tile floors are very slippery when wet, please be careful!

Our maid's name is Gloria. (Picture on the left.) She is wonderful and an extremely hard worker. Her duties include cleaning the entire villa and keeping your towels clean and dry. She'll report to work about 9 am and will let herself in. Gloria is dependable and trustworthy. Bed sheets will only be cleaned once per week, unless they become dirty sooner. Gloria usually goes home around 5 pm.

We have an exquisite cook. Her name is Adela. (Pictured on the right.) You will not be disappointed with her cooking. Please email us in advance with your requested menu for at least the first few days of your visit. We have the menu at the end of these instructions.

Adela will cook two successive meals per day. Therefore, she will cook breakfast and lunch, or lunch and dinner. Please do not ask her to cook three meals per day unless you pay her extra and reimburse for a taxi ride. Of course, you can only have her cook one meal or no meals per day. That is your decision. After the last meal of the day, Adela will present you with receipts for her food shopping. Please pay her at this time. You'll find the first bill to be larger than the others (unless you order shrimp or lobster) because she needs to purchase food to "stock the refrigerator". You might also find a charge for a taxi trip, because with many bags, it is impossible to her to take the bus. Don't expect "a deal" on lobster and shrimp. While very fresh, expect to pay about what you pay in the States.

The staff takes Sunday and major holidays off. None of the staff lives at Villa Karaway, but rather "commutes" to work.

Upon Arrival – Puerto Vallarta

Upon arriving at the airport, catch a cab and ask to go to the Los Palmares condo resort. You have three choices:

- More expensive, but most convenient are the vans or taxis at the airport. While you can somewhat negotiate with them, plan on about \$20 per person, one-way.
- Walk across the pedestrian bridge (just east of the airport building, turn left out of customs) to the other side of the highway and pick up a standard yellow colored cab, price about \$15 for the entire cab, or
- Let us know you want a pick up and we'll arrange it, price \$25 to \$30/person for roundtrip.

Los Palmares and Villa Karaway are located through the town on the south side by another 6 kilometers, via highway 200. (See map at the end.) Total traveling time from the airport is approximately 40 minutes. Since Los Palmares is a fairly new resort, some taxis might not know where it is. If this is the case, tell them that Los Palmares is the last building in Playa Punta Negra area. Please note that there is also a "Las Palmas" resort that is in town. Make sure the cab driver is not confused. If you state "Playa Punta Negra" - they should know the proper location.

There is an ATM located at the airport. After clearing customs, turn left and you'll see a sign "Cambio". Near this sign is an ATM. While U.S. Dollars are gladly accepted, sometimes local currency is more convenient. The best place to get local currency is either at a bank (be prepared for long lines) or via ATMs.

Upon Arrival at Villa Karaway – Los Palmares

Check in with the lobby and tell them that you have arrived and are guests in Unit 104. They will have you sign a guest book. The lobby is on the street level which is actually the fifth floor of the high-rise. Proceed to the elevator past the lobby and go **down** to floor 1. Upon arrival on floor 1 turn right and go down the outside hall to the very end. Your entrance way will be a blue iron gate. The lock is electro-mechanical. After you turn the key, gently pull the gate toward you and you'll hear a click then push the gate open.

Just to the right before Karaway's entranceway is the exercise room to be enjoyed by all of the owners and guest of Los Palmares. If you want to use this room, please ask for a key at the front desk.
